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Précis of 100 Words or Less:	We present both theoretical and empirical explanations to illustrate the potential vulnerability of a pharmaceutical system to corruption and then provide policy recommendations based on our findings. In our theoretical section, we outline how the principal-agent problem, weak or non-existent incentives for high quality performance, and information asymmetry about an agent's characteristics can make decision points in the pharmaceutical system susceptible to corruption. In our empirical findings from our pilot study in Costa Rica, we used both qualitative and quantitative approaches to corroborate or reject our theoretical framework and, more concretely, to identify what decision points and processes are most vulnerable to corruption.
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
