Précis of 100 Words or Less:	The criminal law can play a back-up role in the fight against corruption. The present article discusses five aspects of the criminal law on corruption. First, corruption may be reduced by legalizing some formerly illegal activities and criminalizing others. Second, penalties need to be set to achieve effective deterrence. Third, law enforcement authorities need tools such as plea-bargaining to encourage bribe payers and recipients to cooperate with authorities to uncover corruption. Fourth, corporations and other organizations need to be held responsible for the corrupt actions of their employees. Fifth, because corruption is often a side effect of organized crime activity, authorities need to design strategies to deal with this overlap. In general, the goals of law enforcement should be to determine those corrupt systems that are doing the most damage and to organize the deterrence effort to make corruption costly and to give participants an incentive to report corrupt deals.
