It examines the hypothesis that we need to reassess the role of government in effecting anti-corruption strategies, an importance generally de-emphasized because of the presumed partisan nature of such government action by government. By undertaking a detailed case study, the research will explore the limits of existing best practice and the constraints on government action. The research findings should be of special interest to policy makers, civil society activist and academics interested in promoting more effective policies to combat corruption in South Asia.
